### **YEAR 7: THE ORATOR**

### YEAR 8: THE PHILOSOPHER

This week the Year 8 students have been given their trip letters for the end of year enrichment trip. This is a fantastic opportunity for your child to attend a day at to a theatre production of William Shakespeare's, 'Merry Wives of Windsor' at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre in Stratford-Upon-Avon. This is part of our Stoke Park Experience programme during our whole school enrichment week. This cultural and insightful opportunity will be on Thursday 18th July 2024.

During the visit to the theatre, students will experience both live theatre and to deepen their knowledge and understanding of a key Shakespeare play. This will support them on their next step on the journey ready for Year 9 and their study of Shakespeare.

This trip will allow students to delve into the culture and history of Shakespearean England, whilst also developing their philosophical skills through questioning ideas and themes within the production. In addition, it will allow students to think about the play's deeper meaning and most importantly, the excitement that William Shakespeare has brought to theatres. This trip will allow students to fulfil their journey on the four cornerstones particularly, culture and character. This is also a brilliant opportunity to showcase PRIDE whilst on the visit and really show these values they uphold as a Stoke Park Student.

Students will need to arrive at school for the normal start time of 8.40am. We aim to leave school at 11.00am and leave Stratford-Upon-Avon at 4.30pm. We hope to arrive back in school around 5.30pm-5.45pm. Students should bring a packed lunch with them and plenty of water for the day. If your child has Free School Meals, these will be provided for the trip.

We have managed to secure this incredibly popular trip for the cost of £23.00 per student. Within this price, this covers travel to and from Stratford-Upon-Avon. This trip is for all of Year 8 to attend on this day. Students must attend this trip as part of the Year 8 Stoke Park Experience.

During PSHE, students have been discussing talking points around university and have been learning about the different courses that they can take at university, entry requirements and the process of applying for universities.

In addition, in assembly this week we continued to focus on using our time effectively with just over 1,000 lessons left until they take their GCSE's next year. We particularly looked at screen time and digital detox as, on average, teenagers in the UK have a screen time of seven hours. We looked at the negative effects of this on performance, sleep and health and have set targets to reduce screen time. We are really proud of Year 10 this week as they have made big improvements to their attendance as this has been a key priority over the last term. Students who have above 95% attendance achieve on average half a grade more than their peers. Therefore, we would like to thank parents and carers for ensuring that students are in school and arriving promptly each day.

Finally, we would like to wish our Year 10 football boys the best of luck in their cup final taking place at Warwick University on Monday 20th May. We are so proud of all that they have achieved so far and are all cheering them on!
