YEAR 11: THE ARCHITECT

In Assembly, Year 11 have been learning about the personal sacrifices that many individuals need to make in order to be successful. This is a key characteristic we expect of Year 11 as the Architect as they now need to make tough choices and make sacrifices in order to dedicate the time required towards their revision. It is imperative that in the run up to exams beginning on the 8th May that all students in Year 11 are now revising 5+ hours each night afterschool and 8+ hours at home at the weekends. This means that students need to sacrifice certain commitments and opportunities in order to focus on their revision.

As students have been and should be revising intensively at home it would be beneficial for students to have their own space where they can undertake quiet independent study at home to complete learning prep as well as their own revision for each of their subjects. A revision timetable would support students to manage their time and commitments in order to ensure they are efficient with their time and allocate enough revision time to each subject with regular short breaks included. Students have been shown how to do this over the last two years and will be in the run up to the final set of mock exams which will be start the week beginning the 4th March.

It is vital that all Year 11 students are on site and in classrooms from 8.35am ready to begin intervention every morning at 8.40am in order to make the most of every single intervention they have left in the final straight towards the real exams. We ask for your support in ensuring that students are revising at home, preparing themselves correctly for the school day and in school and on time every day in this crucial last two terms.

YEAR 11: MACBETH PERFORMANCE



On Thursday afternoon, all of our Year 11 students had the opportunity to watch a live performance of 'Macbeth', delivered by Quantum Productions. This superb delivery was instrumental in students' preparation for their upcoming GCSE English Literature exam. Watching a live performance is key in deepening students' understanding of the text, characters and key themes. It also allowed them to see the play as Shakespeare intended it, transforming it from the page to the stage. We are hopeful that this will ultimately stimulate and enhance their exploration of the text as they prepare for their exam.

YEAR 10: THE INVENTOR

This week has been purposeful for our Inventors as they have been receiving feedback from their mock exams that they have recently taken. These exams are insightful to students, staff, and parents/carers, as a working partnership, to gauge progress so far and importantly pinpoint areas for improvement to ensure that they meet their full potential in the May/June 2025 exams. It has been fantastic to see Year 10 showing great resiliency and taking responsibility for their learning by already acting upon feedback from their teachers. There continues to be purposeful teaching and learning conversations happening between subject teachers and students to ensure that students know their next steps and how they can build on their current successes. During tutor time, students have also been having reflective conversations with their tutor based on their recent mocks and are setting themselves SMART targets for the remainder of the term. Students should continue to trial out revision and learning strategies for them to find the one most effective for them. Trial and error and taking risks are all part of being the Inventor at Stoke Park School.

Attendance has been another key focus, and we would like to thank parents and carers for their continued support in ensuring that students are attending school each day and are arriving promptly for their 8:40 start. Students who have above 95% attendance achieve on average half a grade more than their peers.

YEAR 9: THE REVOLUTIONARY

All year 9 parents should have received a text yesterday informing them of our online options evening Miss Muldoon and Mr Owen are hosting Tuesday 6th February from 5pm till 6pm. This will given parents and students chance to sit down and look at all the options choices before the online form will be sent out via teams on Wednesday 7th February, the students will then have chance to look over this in form time and ensure they understand how to do it. Students had an assembly this week delivered by Miss Muldoon to give them more information and students have had options sessions delivered in class times to give them more information. Once the form has been sent out students have exactly 4 weeks to complete this when it closes on Wednesday 6th March. It is not first come first serve so there is no rush on returning the form.
